Pupil Premium Barriers to attainment

- More able children not exceeding across the curriculum
- Low self esteem
- Limited opportunities for 'real-life' experiences.
- Poor educational and life aspirations.
- Poor or late attendance
- Low household income

Nature of support 2018-19

(For pupils in receipt of pupil premium funding)

- Provide pupils with opportunities for extra-curricular provision/experiences and to develop pupil well-being.
- Target pupils who are not on track, to achieve in reading, writing and maths, including those receiving pupil premium, are a looked after child or have a parent in the armed forces.
- A specialist pupil premium practitioner providing planned intervention for children meeting the pupil premium criteria for whom an area of development has been identified.
- Additional teaching assistant support for disadvantaged children with specific social and emotional needs. (Pastoral TA)
- Teaching assistant led interventions and booster groups in every class, particularly for pupils in receipt of the pupil premium grant who also have special educational needs.
- FREE breakfast club
- FREE music tuition
- FREE swimming transport
- FREE educational visits (including residential trip)
- FREE Beaupre school jumper available

Over the year the percentage of pupils attending who were pupil premium was 27% for KS1 and Years 5/6 and 12% for years ¾.
