## Practical Environmental Science in Green Class

Appropriately enough, Green Class have been looking at pollution, habitat destruction and global warming this term, so we weren't surprised when the temperature suddenly soared.

During the morning, Patrick also gave us some information about steam trains, old cameras and bathing machines. Just before lunch, the children made their own train ticket, ready for the afternoon from (Downham Market to Hunstanton) and decided if they were going to travel in 1st, 2nd or 3rd class. Unsurprisingly, many children decided to travel 1st class given the weather, but there were some money-savers who decided to travel in 2nd or 3rd class.

## Rainbow Class

# Bastille Day

## Purple Class

We began the day listening and discussing Bastille Day and why it is celebrated in France on the 14<sup>th</sup> July. The children were inquisitive and asked lots of questions about why the people were unhappy and started to uprise against their king.

The children produced their own double page spread of facts and pictures, using our knowledge of French numbers. We looked at the artist Georges Surate and used his method of pointillism to complete a picture. We also enjoyed singing Frere Jacques in the sunshine, drew The Eiffel Tower using a step-by-step guide and read a text with a question and answer session on animals, all in French. A great fun-filled French day!



## Bastille Day à la Green Class

Green Class started their day with a bit of Queen: “Let them eat cake!” she said, just like Marie Antoinette. But who was Marie Antoinette? More importantly, what’s wrong with a bit of cake?

We role-played the social hierarchy and realised that the nobles and clergy made life really difficult for the workers, most of whom were farmers. We looked at how they took money and crops as tax to make sure that they could lead a fabulous lifestyle.

To find out just how fabulous, we took a brief tour of the Palace of Versailles and were amazed at the amount of gold and the size of the corridors and rooms, not to mention the gardens. Having studied some bird’s-eye views, we used our maths and art skills to design our own majestic symmetrical and geometric gardens fit for King Louis XVI.

We then thought again about how Marie Antoinette’s comment would have made people angry and what it told us about how little the royalty knew about what it was like to be poor, before going through the events of the 14<sup>th</sup> July and how that started the revolution, with a little help from Horrible Histories. Some of the class thought that Bastille Day must be as important to the French as Independence Day is to Americans. To pull all of our learning together, we created a double page spread with our partners to share our knowledge of the day and its events.



## Orange and Yellow Class

Orange and Yellow Class worked collaboratively throughout the morning of Bastille Day celebrated on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> July at Beaupre Community Primary School. We researched various facts about France including famous people and landmarks, interesting facts, population and currency.

We participated in reading activities around the French Revolution and why the storming of Bastille in 1789 was deemed necessary. The children then produced some lovely writing explaining the events that took place on that particular day and why the people of France still celebrate it today. In the afternoon Orange class took part in a quiz and were French artists creating collages.



# Important Information



## PE Kit for 2022/23

We have decided that we will continue to follow the system of wearing PE kit into school on PE days as this saves time in lessons... and reduces the amount of lost property!!

We know that the summer holidays are the normal time to re-equip for the year ahead, and as children will be wearing their kit all day, we would just like to remind you of what PE kit should be.

School PE kit consists of:

a plain white t-shirt  
plain black or navy shorts  
trainers or plimsolls.

In the winter or in cold weather, tracksuit trousers or leggings may be worn for outdoor PE. Tracksuit trousers and leggings should be black or navy.

On PE days, the usual school uniform jumper, sweatshirt or cardigan should be worn over the white t-shirt. This can be kept on for PE if it is chilly. **Children should not be wearing hoodies for PE.**

Please remember that piercings will need to be removed for PE lessons and long hair tied back.

Thank you for your help in continuing to make sure that the children are looking smart around school and are properly prepared to make the most of their PE lessons.

## School Uniform

**Boys:** Black or grey trousers or shorts, white or sky blue polo shirt, navy sweatshirt or fleece, black shoes.

**Girls:** Black, navy or grey skirt, pinafore trousers or shorts, white or sky blue polo shirt, blue gingham dress, navy sweatshirt, cardigan or fleece, black shoes.

**PE Kit:** Plain white T-shirt, plain black or navy shorts, plimsolls or trainers, tracksuit for cold weather.

**Swimming:** One piece swimsuit (girls), swimming trunks (boys), towel. Earrings must be removed.

Long hair must always be tied back. Earrings must be studs or small sleepers and must be removed for PE and swimming.




