History of Music Day

Elder Class

Chestnut Class



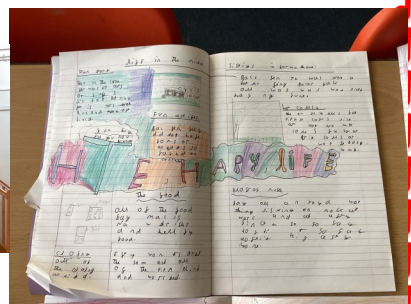
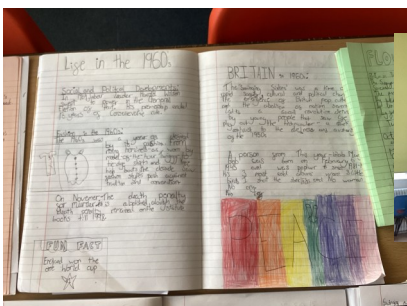

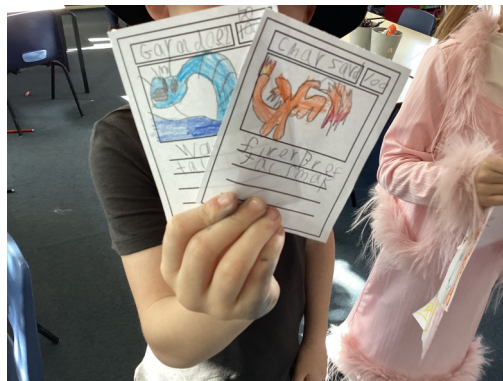
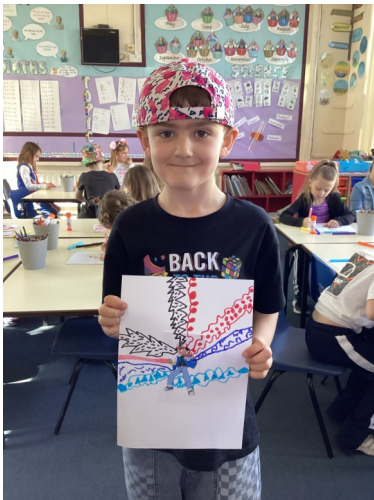
History of Music Day

Design & Technology - Oak Class

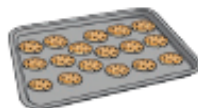

We prepared and cooked Vietnamese vegetable rolls, Chinese Stir-fry and Indian Bombay potatoes. The children had an excellent time and engaged brilliantly in the learning opportunity. Upon the children's request, I have attached the recipes below for them to share at home. I hope you enjoyed sampling their creations.

Mix together 1 tbsp rice wine vinegar, ½ tsp oil, 1 tsp sugar and 1 tsp fish sauce. Add this dressing to the noodles and vegetables. 4. Soak the summer roll wrappers in lukewarm water for a few minutes. Once pliable, place on a board. 5. Add a spoonful of the vegetable and noodle mixture onto the wrapper, and roll up as you tuck in the sides. 6. Make a dipping sauce from rice wine vinegar, herbs, oil, fish sauce, sugar and lime juice. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Cook and cool the noodles. 2. Finely dice the ginger and garlic. 3. Slice the vegetables. 4. Arrange ingredients on a plate in the order they will be cooked with the 'holy trio' of ginger, garlic and onion first. 5. Mix the soy sauce, lime and honey together. 6. Heat the vegetable oil on a medium heat. 7. Add your 'holy trio' and stir-fry until fragrant. 8. Add your vegetables one by one and keep stirring. 9. Add noodles and then the sauce. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Chop potatoes and par-boil in water with 1 tsp turmeric. 2. Cool the potatoes and place on a sheet of foil. 3. Crush the cumin and mustard seeds. 4. Add these and other spices to the potato. 5. Season with salt and 1 tsp oil. 6. Add the spinach and mix with your hands. 7. Make a foil parcel and bake in the oven at 200°C for 20 – 25 minutes. 8. Serve with yoghurt, coriander and tomatoes.

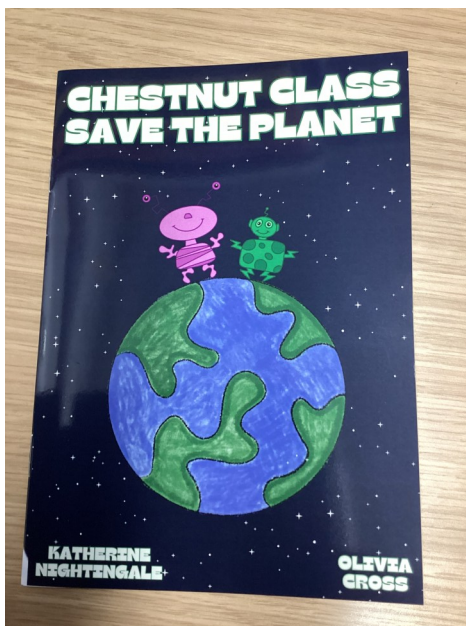


Chestnut Class Save the Planet

Polish Easter Traditions

Chestnut Class have been learning about Easter and some family traditions associated with this. We are very fortunate to have some children in our class that have families living in other countries and we have been finding out about their traditions too.

Matilda, showed us a beautiful basket of eggs and Easter objects. Many of the eggs had intricate covers crocheted by Matilda's nan in Poland. Matilda explained that in Poland on Good Friday, children decorated hard boiled eggs with marker pens or stickers. Traditionally, holes would be put into fresh eggs with a needle and the contents blown out. However, many eggs break and it can get very messy.

On Easter Saturday, food baskets are prepared and taken to church for the priest to bless. Each item of food has a special significance and can vary depending on where you live in Poland.

Bread - symbol of the life and body of Christ. It ensures prosperity and good luck. It is one of the MOST important elements.

Ham - It is a representation of health and prosperity.

Salt - symbol of purification and durability.

Cake - The cake is a symbol of excellence and life abilities.

Horseradish sauce - A symbol of strength and vigour.

Hard boiled decorated egg - symbol of fertility, birth and resurrection.

Lamb shaped sugar figurine - it symbolizes Jesus Christ and his self-sacrifice. It is usually decorated with the Resurrection Banner, a paper flag with a red cross on a white background that symbolizes Jesus's victory over death.

Easter Sunday starts with very early mass (around 6am) followed by traditional breakfast with a pray and the food from basket.

During the Easter meal there is an Easter egg fight. Each person has a boiled egg and chooses a partner. You hold the boiled egg with the narrow tip pointing forward. The two people (on the count of three) will knock their egg against the other. Whoever's egg cracks is the loser and the one with an unbroken egg is the winner. The winner goes on to play against the winner of another pair. Whoever has the unbroken egg at the end is the winner!

On Easter Monday or 'Wet Monday', people, especially young people, playfully douse each other with water, using anything from water pistols to buckets. The water throwing is seen as a way to celebrate the end of Lent and the joy of Easter, and it can be seen as a way to express affection and fun. Matilda explains that if she is visiting family or friends, she would take egg shaped water guns to spray whoever she meets. Watch out if you see Matilda on Easter Monday, she could have a water pistol in her pocket!

On Thursday afternoon, Oak Class took their learning outside to explore the woodland area. We attempted our first session of whittling, creating wands from sticks. We also had the opportunity for exploring and making bug villages for our insects and mini-beasts, as well as den building. Following the sessions, we also created Easter cards using leaves, sticks and other fascinating finds from the forest floor, created mud kitchen recipes using various herbs and spices and even lentils. We also cut out shapes from cards to provide a photography learning opportunity taking photographs of beautiful nature with our cut out frames, celebrating our stunning natural space. We were very excited to be joined by some of our parents, thank you for coming along and I hope you all had as much fun as we did.





Elder Class

On the morning of Thursday 3rd April, Elder Class spent a lovely morning in our woodland area. There were a variety of activities that the children became fully involved in which commenced with making tree faces out of clay. The mud kitchen was very popular and the children enjoyed adding fresh and dried herbs to their recipes. Additionally, the children really enjoyed designing their own perfumes and branding them. The dens that were built by the children were incredibly impressive – one even had a working door! The children made wooden hedgehog keyrings, which involved whittling – a new skill learnt.
