The results were overwhelmingly positive:

- Parents, staff, and Governors showed overwhelming support for implementing an active uniform
- There was clear preference for a darker coloured polo shirt to replace our current white/light blue options

These results were presented to our Governing Body on Wednesday 9th July, where it was unanimously agreed to move forward with this exciting change. The change will be phased in from September so that existing uniform can still be used.

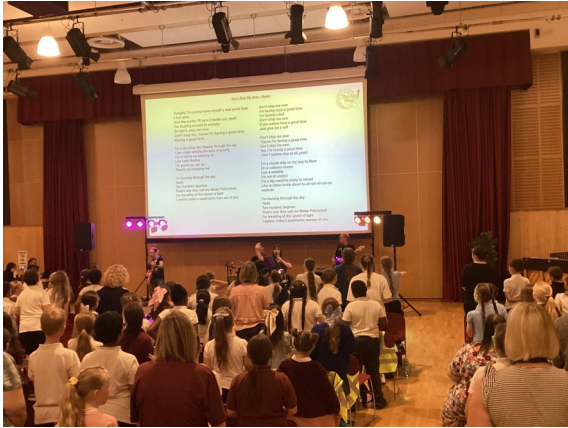

Food and Nutrition - Cedar Class

Last week, Cedar Class made overnight oats as part of their DT topic on Food and Nutrition. We learnt lots about the sugar that is added to food such as breakfast cereals and made these oats as a delicious and healthy alternative. We used vanilla yoghurt to mix with the oats and made one bowl full with some water as per the recipe. The children enjoyed using knives to cut their fruit toppings to the correct size and gave the oats a try. Most gave it a thumbs up! 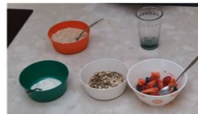
Overnight oats

Replace the water with yoghurt if you wish!



You will need:

- 75g porridge oats (25g for toppings)
- 100g cold water
- Handful of soft fruit
- 2 tsp seeds
- 2 tsp plain yoghurt



1. Place 50g of oats and the water in a mixing bowl, mix and leave in the fridge overnight.
2. Chop the soft fruit and place in a bowl overnight.
3. Lightly toast the remaining oats and seeds in an oven at 180°C until golden.
4. Layer the oats, fruit and seeds in a glass or bowl.
5. Top with natural yoghurt and soft fruits.

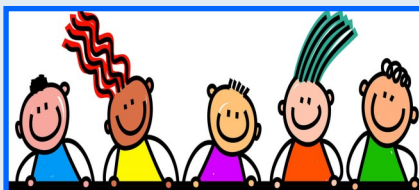

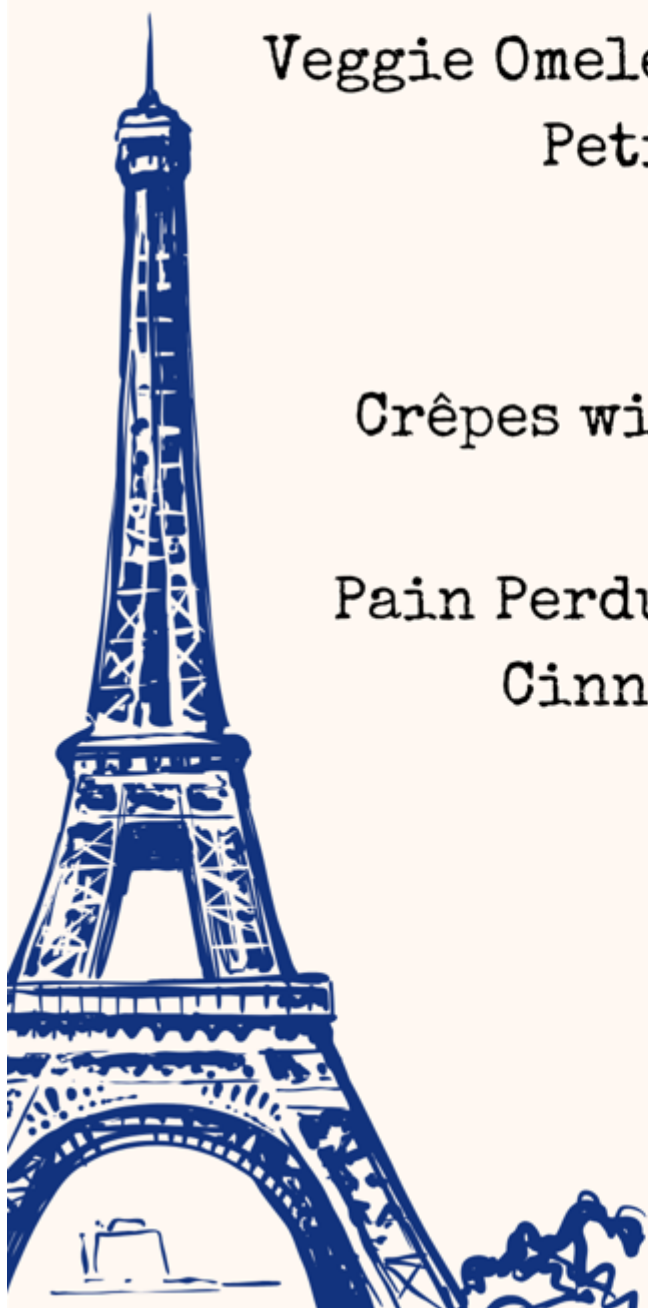
