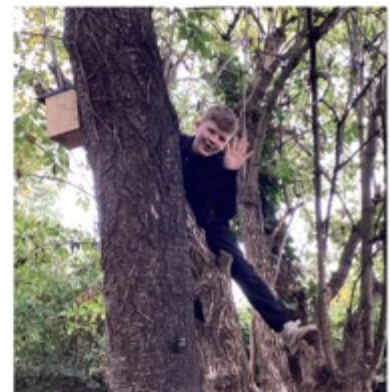


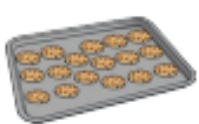
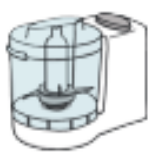
Elder Class

On Wednesday afternoon, the children had their first forest session for this academic year. The session started with the children being tasked with creating clay pumpkin faces, decorated with natural resources, on the woodland trees. The children then had the opportunity to explore the forest and build witches' dens. Other activities on offer were to create pumpkin bird feeders, use herbs and flowers to create witches' potion and perfume and to cook witches' brew in the mud kitchen using fresh garden herbs. Additionally, the children had the opportunity to create skeletons, spiders, devils, cats and pumpkins using potato printing and to weave spider webs.

The session ended with them enjoying butternut squash soup that some of the children had made that morning, which tasted delicious.

They were then set their task; To make their own flapjacks!

But it's not as simple as it sounds. This involves researching and tasting a range of flapjacks already on the market, tasting and exploring a combination of ingredients, working together to design and agree on a new recipe, baking the flapjacks (after our special guest, Laslo the school cook, visited us for a flapjack demonstration and Q's and A's about his career), creating posters for their stalls, designing TV adverts on Ipads to help to sell their flapjacks and last but not least, selling their creations to the rest of the school.

The children also voted on a range of charities that they wished to donate the money raised to. The charity chosen was The Salvation Army in Wisbech, who support the homeless by providing regular soup kitchens etc.

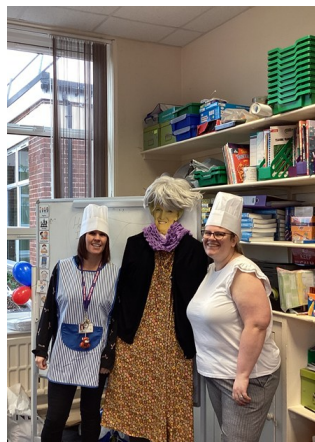
Laurel & Maple Class Collaborative Learning

The money raised at the end of all this was £89.29. Thanks to everyone involved to make this as successful as it was and to all those who bought and enjoyed our flapjacks.











Oak Class

Design & Technology

On Monday, Oak Class were developing their understanding of cuisine from around the world. We made Garlic Butter Flatbreads (Italy), Smorrebrod (Poland and Germany), and a Mezze Bowl (Greece). The children thoroughly enjoyed sampling different flavours and textures, the Garlic Butter Flatbread and Rye Bread were firm favourites. Upon the children's request, I have attached the recipes below, for the children to share with you and to provide the opportunity for you to try at home.

Dish 	Flatbread and garlic butter
Equipment 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mixing bowls Scales Measuring jugs Graters Griddle pans or frying pans Chopping boards Pastry brushes Vegetable knives Pestle and mortar
Ingredients 	<p>Quantities for two pupils:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 200g plain flour • 2 tsp olive oil • ½ tsp salt • Cold water • 50g butter • 1 clove garlic • ½ lemon • 1 tsp fresh parsley
Method 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Mix together the flour, salt and olive oil. 2. Add cold water a little at a time and mix with a table knife until a soft dough is formed. 3. Knead the dough for 2 minutes. 4. Grate the butter, crush the garlic and zest the lemon. 5. Mix the butter, garlic and lemon zest into a paste. 6. Heat a griddle or frying pan. 7. Split the dough into 4 – 6 pieces and roll each piece into a rough circle. 8. Brush with olive oil and cook on each side for 1 – 2 minutes. 9. Spread the garlic butter on the hot bread.

Miss Summers, English Lead, enjoyed sharing information about the benefits of reading with parents and carers – whilst refreshments were enjoyed. The main message being that reading for pleasure is of the utmost importance. There were a variety of exciting opportunities taking place around books, ranging from making wands, Halloween paper chains and black cats, to creating their own Mr Men or Little Miss self-characters and other books characters. There was also the opportunity for adults to share books with the children.

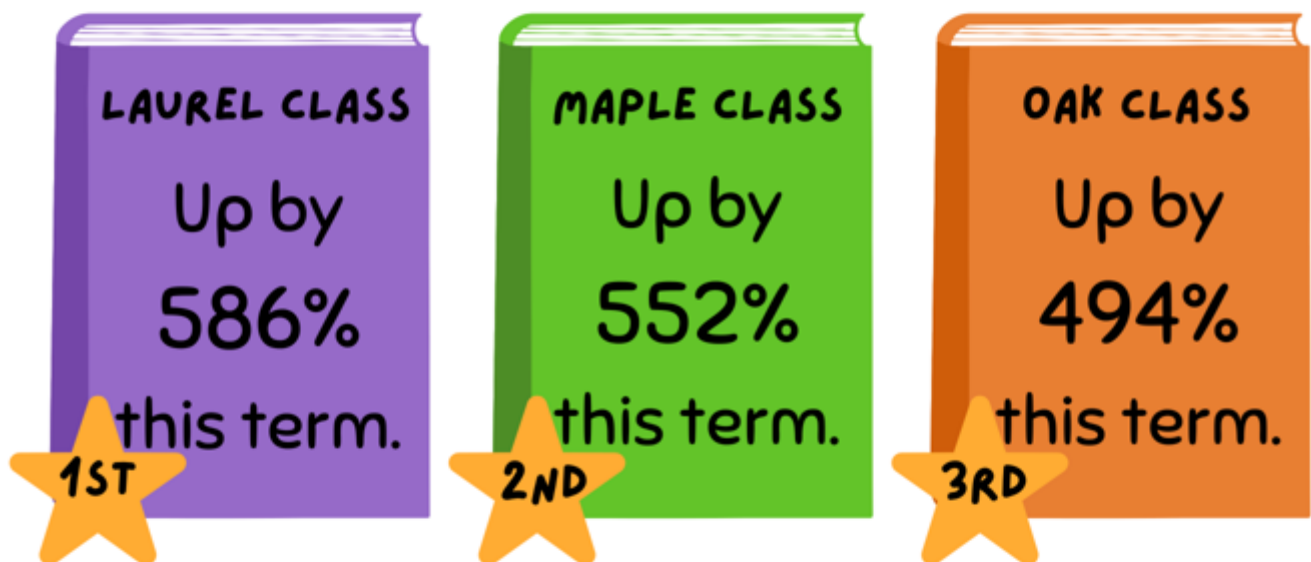

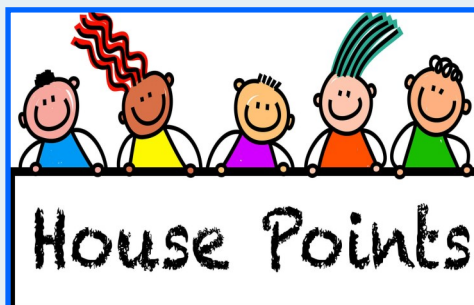

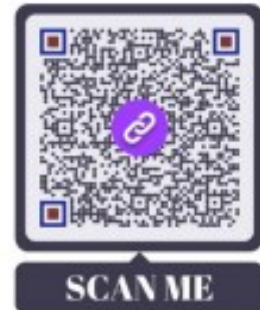
