Each class made educational visits to a range of locations to widen pupil's experiences and support their learning back at school. Pupil voice indicated that 88% of PP pupils asked enjoyed their trip. 1 person did not and another had no opinion.	Funding to continue so all pupils have access to educational visits and extra-curricular experiences.	£1,844
<i>To ensure all PP children have the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument</i>	Tutor for guitar, ukulele. Providing instruments for children to use.	We had a new music tutor this year and pupil confidence was boosted. Pupil voice indicated that 78% of pupils enjoyed learning an instrument and 22% of pupils had no opinion.	Continue to fund free lessons for PP pupils to encourage individual interests.	£818
<i>To ensure all PP children have the opportunity to extend interests.</i>	Extra-curricular clubs provided by teachers as well as sports tutors. Swimming lessons	Clubs included choir, computing, multi-sports and dance. Choir had an opportunity to perform carols at a nearby garden centre at Christmas and also attended a national choir event, which was received positively by all involved. Choir was well attended throughout the year. 30% of pupils attending dance clubs were PP. Multi sports is most popular with PP pupils in year 5 and 6 in the Autumn and Spring terms, although their numbers do decrease in the summer term, possibly due to SATs and it becomes more popular with KS1 PP pupils. Over the year the percentage of pupils attending who were pupil premium was 27% for KS1 and Years 5/6 and 12% for years 3/4.	Continue to provide extra-curricular activities and monitor the number of Pupil Premium pupils who attend. Develop curricular interests such as science through delivering and broad and varied curriculum.	£1,132

<i>To provide targeted and additional teaching for identified pupils. (Support attainment)</i>	Pupil Premium Practitioner	Provided a variety of additional teaching opportunities/interventions for pupils in receipt of the Pupil Premium based on teacher assessment of pupil need. Continue and tighten up assessment of need to ensure specific targets for pupils so this can be evaluated more effectively.	£17,081
	Class teaching assistants	The school purchased the Sandwell testing set halfway through the year and this has supported our standardised assessments. The success @ arithmetic programme was run with one group in year 6 this year. 4 pupils took part and all pupils showed an improvement in their scores and confidence. The average % score of the 4 pupils went from 28% before to 71% after the intervention. That is an average increase of 43%. After a discussion with the TA who delivered the intervention and one of the pupils who took part, they agreed that if the intervention was run to the exact timescale recommended it would be more effective. Unfortunately, due to some timetabling difficulties we were not always able to stick to the timescale. The talk boost intervention was also initiated in year 2 and year 6.
